



Summer Vacation Safety Tips

During the summer months, millions of Americans leave their homes to take long-awaited vacations. While this should be a time of adventure and relaxation, this time away can leave your home and vehicles vulnerable to break-ins and burglary. To help keep your home and property safe, the Daly City Police Department advises you to take several precautionary actions before you leave.

-  Be sure to lock all doors, windows and the side gate to your backyard. Don't forget to secure your pet entry.
-  Let your trusted neighbors know that you will be on vacation, and ask them to check on your house every now and then. If you expect any visitors such as a landscapers, housekeeper or a pet sitter, let your neighbor know. If not, and they see unexpected activity, have them call 9-1-1.
-  Secure any yard tools or outdoor furniture you have. Burglars can use these to break through your windows and doors.
-  Turn your back porch and front porch lights on.
-  If you will be gone for more than a week, ask your local post office to put your mail on hold while you're away.

Daly City Youth Advisory Committee Now Accepting Applications

Daly City is calling on civic-minded middle and high school students to consider joining the Daly City Youth Advisory Committee (DCYAC).

Created in May, the DCYAC provides school-aged Daly City residents with the opportunity to serve on a board of their peers to observe and participate in the local government process.

Committee members will meet monthly to discuss issues affecting their schools, neighborhoods and community.

By participating in the DCYAC, members will develop an understanding of how municipal government works and the role it plays in the daily lives of those who live, work and play in the City.

Subjects they will learn about include: municipal finance, public safety, water and sanitation, public works, community development, planning and zoning, social services, recreation, libraries and federal and state regulations.

Members of the committee will develop a work plan at the beginning of each school year that will include organizing or supporting a community event, interacting with youth committees from other jurisdictions and collaborating with other groups for large-scale community service projects.

Members of the DCYAC will serve for one-year terms, and include at least one representative from each of Daly City's middle schools and high



schools. School principals, or their designees, will be responsible for selecting the student representatives.

DCYAC members will be appointed in September.

Make Water Conservation a Habit

Follow these tips to reduce outdoor water use during the dry summer months:

- 💧 Water in the early morning or late evening to reduce evaporation and increase absorption
- 💧 Turn off irrigation during and for 48 hours after rain
- 💧 Prevent run-off by checking and repairing broken sprinkler heads
- 💧 Use a shut-off hose nozzle with a bucket to wash your car
- 💧 Use a broom, not a hose, to sweep your patio, driveway or sidewalk

Using water efficiently is an essential way of life for Californians. Do your part to help protect our precious water resources for current and future generations.

Point Martin Gets Green Light from City Council

In May, the City Council approved a General Plan amendment and the rezoning of the Point Martin II planned neighborhood.

Located at the west side of Carter Street and Steve Courter Way, the presently vacant, 18-acre site is planned to be developed into two residential neighborhoods and a 9.7-acre open space.

The site presently consists of 49 separate lots, owned by 29 different property owners who cooperated to submit one application for approval of the General Plan amendment, rezoning, and to subdivide 8.3-acres of the site into two neighborhoods with 117 residential lots.

Lot sizes within the subdivision are proposed to range between 1,233 and 2,423 square feet, with maximum lot coverages of up to 65 percent, and building height limits of up to 35 feet.

Because the proposed lot sizes and building envelopes exceed the allowances otherwise permitted by the traditional R-1 Single Family Residential District regulations, the developer, Point Martin LLC, requested the approval of Planned Development zoning for the site.

While residents who participated in the public hearing generally approved of the development, there were concerns raised about City subsidies for property development and maintenance. According to the developer, all water and sewer lines, roads and street lighting will be paid for and maintained in perpetuity by the property owners.

Currently, while a General Plan amendment and rezoning have been approved, no building permits have been applied for by the developer.
