### Notable Cases

On Saturday, 08-17-13, Officer Noah Serbin and Officer Joshua Moala were dispatched to the 400 block of 88<sup>th</sup> Street on a report of a suspicious vehicle with an unconscious subject seated in the driver seat. When the officers arrived, they saw the vehicle was blocking a driveway of an apartment complex parking garage entryway. The officers found the subject with one leg out of the vehicle and a pool of vomit below his foot. The subject apparently had been drinking and could not explain why his car was parked where it was. When officers were searching the subject, they found a plastic baggie of suspected cocaine. The subject, a 33-year old Daly City resident, was arrested for possession of cocaine and public intoxication.

On Sunday, 08-18-13 at 9:54 PM, Officer Lee Aquila was dispatched to the area of John Daly Boulevard and Mission Street on a report of a suspicious person. Officer Aquila saw a subject exiting the Public Storage on Mission Street and was carrying a large number of items. When the officer contacted the subject, he saw the subject holding clothes and a folded up mat and asked if he was sleeping at the public storage facility. The subject said he wasn't. The officer then noticed two large wooden items sticking out of the subject's front pants pocket. The wooden objects were "Nunchakas", and the subject was advised they were illegal to possess. The subject, a 41-year old Daly City resident, was arrested for possession of a dangerous weapon and was booked into the San Mateo County jail.

The left rear window was smashed. Occurred on 08-16-13 between 6:55 PM and 8:30 PM.
- Krispy Kreme parking lot—a purse was taken from a 2011 Range rover. The right front window was smashed. Occurred on 08-17-13 between 8:35 PM and 8:45 PM.

## Community Events

### Coyotes

Yesterday I had the pleasure of attending the “Skyline –Palisades Homeowners and Residential Association”, and the subject of coyotes was brought up, as that area seems to be riddled with an emerging coyote population. The residents were concerned of their safety and the safety of their pets. In speaking with the Animal Control officials, I learned that under California State law, relocation of coyotes is illegal. They state that lethal removal is ineffective and unethical, since another coyote will simply take its place, often within weeks. They further stated that the local coyotes are here to stay and that they hope that the community learns to peacefully coexist with them. The juvenile coyotes will soon be dispersing from their family groups, and this runs from September to November. “How can we peacefully coexist with coyotes?”, some of you may ask. I referenced “Project Coyote”, a non-profit organization whose mission is to promote educated coexistence between people and coyotes by championing progressive management policies that reduce human-coyote conflict, supporting innovative scientific research, and fostering respect for coyotes. According to “Project Coyote”, coyotes are members of the dog family, yet eat large numbers of rodents and rabbits, as well as fruit, vegetation, insects and carrion. They may be more protective of their dens or territories especially during pup season, which runs from April until August. They are naturally wary of people, but they can habituate to our presence and the reliable food source that we perhaps provide. Some tips on safety are to NOT FEED the coyotes—this means we need to pick up our trash, secure our garbage and keep food and pets inside at night. We need to keep our pets on leashes and pick up our small dogs if we see a coyote. If approached, we are not to run. We instead should wave our arms, make noise and be “big, bad and loud”. Lastly, we should avoid areas where coyotes could be denning or feeding/hiding pups.

### Nixle is here!

“What is Nixle?” Residents can now receive important advisories, community updates, and official information from the Police Department by text message and email! There are several police agencies in San Mateo County already utilizing this service, and our Police Department just got the go-ahead to start publishing information. The City of Daly City launched “iHelp”, an innovative citizen’s service request and civic engagement tool allowing residents to easily interact and stay connected with their local government. *Daly City iHelp* is a free mobile device application (“app”) and is available from the Apple and Google app stores for immediate download. By utilizing this service, residents can access important City information, report issues (graffiti, garbage complaints, etc.), and track requests online and via mobile devices.
