Notable Cases

On Tuesday, 05-20-14 at 12:18 p.m., a Walgreen's employee on Mission Street was pushed to the ground by a shoplifting suspect as he fled the scene with a backpack full of shampoo and razors that he concealed. The clerk sustained an abrasion on his elbow as a result of being pushed to the ground. The suspect is still at large.

On Wednesday, 05-21-14 at 4:14 p.m., Officer Jaime Bermudez and Officer Tiffany Cook were patrolling Serramonte Shopping Center where there have been some recent auto burglaries and contacted a male subject who was sitting in a vehicle. The subject, a 29-year old Half Moon Bay resident, was on active probation with a search clause. While searching the vehicle, officers found a sizeable amount of suspected cocaine and methamphetamine individually packaged for sale, along with other drug paraphernalia and packaging material. The subject was arrested for possession of cocaine for sale, possession of a controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia, committing a felony while out on bail and for participating in a criminal street gang.

On Thursday, 05-22-14 at 4:25 p.m., Officer Bonnie Shiu was dispatched to a report of a suspicious circumstance at a residence on the 600 block of Stoneyford Drive. The reporting party said an unidentified male approached his residence and stated he was making a delivery to the residence, but no package was seen or found. The subject was described as an Asian male, possibly Filipino or Thai, with dark skin, approximately 5'4", slender build, with a "skinny face". The subject was not wearing any kind of uniform depicting a delivery company. The reporting party saw the subject was driving a silver Dodge Caravan.

On Friday, 05-23-14 at approximately 10:00 p.m., Officer Gary Thompson was dispatched to Thornton Beach Vista on a report of a physical fight where one subject had a baseball bat. The mutual fight involved two males in their early 30's who both ended up being transported to San Francisco General Hospital for their injuries. One subject sustained swelling all over his face from

being punched several times and also had pain to his neck. The other subject had a severe cut to his forehead after being hit in the head with a baseball bat.

On Friday, 05-23-14 at 8:57 p.m., Officer Shane Hart conducted a traffic stop at the intersection of the Sullivan Avenue and San Fernando Way for a vehicle that nearly ran over a pedestrian. The passenger in the vehicle appeared nervous and didn't make eye contact with the officer. After the officer learned the passenger had previous arrests for possession of a controlled substance and for possession of controlled substance paraphernalia, he asked the passenger if she would speak to him. She did not want the vehicle searched and said it was not okay to search her belongings in the vehicle. Officer Bruce Perdomo and his K-9 partner, "Utah", walked around the vehicle, and "Utah" alerted the officer to the passenger door area of the vehicle. Officer Perdomo found a purse containing a clear glass pipe used to smoke methamphetamine, and he found pill bottles containing methamphetamine. He also found more pipes and pills in the vehicle. The suspect, a 33-year old Belmont resident, was arrested for possession of a controlled substance, possession of a narcotic controlled substance, possession of controlled substance paraphernalia and for possession of a controlled substance without a prescription.

On Saturday, 05-24-14 at 9:21 a.m., Officer Ben Wagnon was on patrol in the area of Shakespeare Street and San Jose Avenue when he saw a male subject sitting on the sidewalk who appeared to be having an animated conversation with himself. The subject, a 32-year old San Francisco resident, said he was on court probation and was subject to search and seizure. He admitted to Officer Wagnon that he had a needle in his pocket, as he injects heroin. Officer Wagnon did not find the needle in the pocket but found it in his duffel bag which was alongside him. The needle contained a substance which appeared to be heroin. The subject was arrested for possession of heroin and for possession of narcotics paraphernalia.

Robberies

There was one robbery during the past week.

On Thursday, 05-22-14 at 1:54 a.m., officers were dispatched to the area of Sullivan Avenue and 92nd Street on a report of a strong armed robbery that had occurred within the last 5-10 minutes. The 45-year old victim said she was removing items from her trunk when she saw a black male adult walking in the middle of the street on Sullivan Avenue. She heard him say something in English to her, but she doesn't speak English and didn't understand it. She said she was then attacked from behind and punched on the right side of her face by another unknown male with a closed fist. The subject who initially walked toward her took her bag that was draped across her shoulder, and the other subject kicked her in the back two to four times. The victim said after she started screaming, the subjects got into a silver SUV and fled. The loss is a shoulder bag containing a wallet, credit cards, paycheck and a cell phone. The victim suffered scrapes and abrasions but refused medical treatment.

Residential Burglaries

There were two attempted residential burglaries during the past week.

On Monday, 05-19-14 between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m., a residence on the 600 block of Hickey Boulevard was the victim of an attempted burglary via a pry to the rear lower level screen window. No entry was made.

On Friday, 05-23-14 at approximately 3:00 p.m., a resident on the 500 block of Verducci Drive was the victim of an attempted burglary. The resident said he heard a knock on the front door and looked through the peep hole and saw an Asian female, approximately 25 years old, 5'6", red

hair, wearing blue jeans and carrying white papers. Since he doesn't speak English well, he did not answer the door. Approximately 10-15 later, he said he heard a banging noise in the backyard and thought it was coming from his neighbor's yard. He said he then heard something banging outside the second story bedroom window. He looked out the window and saw a male wearing dark clothes and a wool cap who was hanging on the rails of the window. The victim banged on the window, and the suspect let go of the window and ran from the backyard. The victim saw an older model Japanese car driving away, but he could not get the license plate.

Commercial Burglaries

There were three commercial burglaries and one attempted commercial burglary during the past week.

On Saturday, 05-24-14 between 12:30 a.m. and 1:50 a.m., the Town and Country Billiards was the victim of burglary by an unknown subject who took an unknown amount of U.S. coins from a video game machine by prying the front panel of the video game and taking the coins from the metal coin box.

On Saturday, 05-24-14 between 3:00 a.m. and 3:05 a.m., the King Wah restaurant was the victim of burglary by two subjects who pried open the rear door of the business and took the safe containing cash. The subjects fed in a red 1995-2005 Chevrolet Blazer or GMC Jimmy. This case is under investigation.

Between 5:45 p.m. on Saturday, 05-24-14 and 8:49 a.m. on Sunday, 05-25-14, the Re Planet Recycling Center at Serramonte Shopping Center was the victim of a burglary. An unknown suspect cut the two pad locks of a roll up door and took coins from a combination/key lock safe.

On Monday, 05-19-14 at 6:55 a.m., the 7-Eleven on Gellert Boulevard was the victim of an attempted burglary by a suspect who removed a box of headphones by cutting it off the display stand with a large knife. The subject was described only as an African American male, approximately 5'7", 160 lbs., wearing a dark gray jacket and red pants. The subject left the store without the headphones.

Vehicle Burglaries

There were six vehicle burglaries during the past week.

- 200 block of Polaris Way—shoes, electronic chargers and cash were taken from a 1999 Honda CRV. The method of entry is unknown. Occurred between 6:45 p.m. on 05-19-14 and 5:30 a.m. on 05-20-14.
- Unit block of Portola Avenue—change, tools and a garage door opener were taken from a 2005 Toyota Matrix. The method of entry is unknown. Occurred between 11:20 p.m. on 05-19-14 and 7:20 a.m. on 05-20-14. **On-line report.
- Callan Boulevard between Southgate Avenue and Clarinada Avenue—mail was taken from a 2000 Toyota Corolla. The rear passenger was smashed. Occurred between 8:00 p.m. on 05-23-14 and 5:00 a.m. on 05-24-14.
- Callan Boulevard near Macy's—a passport and phone chargers were taken from a 2005 Honda Accord. The passenger window was smashed. Occurred between 7:00 p.m. on 05-23-14 and 4:00 a.m. on 05-24-14.
- Serramonte Shopping Center parking lot near Macy's—nothing taken from a 2004 Toyota Matrix. The front passenger window was smashed. Occurred on 05-25-14 between 2:00 p.m. and 2:23 p.m.

- 600 block of Lisbon Street—a bottle of champagne, a disabled placard, owner’s manual, CD’s and a purse containing a checkbook and credit cards was taken from a 2007 Mercedes C230. The method of entry is unknown. Occurred between 10:00 p.m. on 05-25-14 and 9:30 a.m. on 05-26-14.

Stolen Vehicles

There were three stolen vehicles during the past week.

- 500 block of South Hill Boulevard—a 1998 Infinity I30. Occurred on 05-20-14 between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m.

“Find My iPhone” App

The Palo Alto Police Department reported this week that they used the “Find My iPhone” app to track a stolen vehicle and the thief. The victim had his iPhone in the vehicle when it was stolen, but because he had installed that particular app on his phone, the police were able to locate it.

I encourage you to enable your security features on your portable electronic devices whenever possible and to also familiarize yourself on how to use them. Should you lose your device or have it stolen, and you are using a remote application to track its location, do not take matters into your own hands to attempt to recover your items.
