## Halloween Safety

Halloween is a great time of year that allows children to put on their spookiest costumes and load up on candy from friends and neighbors. While the fun of the holiday can be exciting for children, parents need to ensure their kids are safe and responsible while out at night. These safety tips can help you and your family have a happy and safe Halloween.

- 🎃 The most common danger to children on Halloween is being hit by a motor vehicle. To prevent accidents like these, attach reflective stickers or tape to your child's candy bag or bucket, and have them carry a flashlight or glow stick.
- 🎃 Remind children to always use crosswalks and corners to cross the street. Even at these intersections, it's important to ensure they look both ways before crossing, as drivers will be distracted.
- 🎃 Talk with your child and plan out a trick-or-treat route in a familiar neighborhood. Remind them to stay in well-populated and lit areas.
- 🎃 Remind your child to never enter a stranger's home unless accompanied by you or another supervising adult.
- 🎃 As always, children should be supervised and accompanied by a parent or responsible adult. While teens will want to go alone, you are still responsible for them and should remind them to be respectful of other people's property and young children who are also enjoying the holiday.
- 🎃 Trick-or-treating hours are between the hours of 5:30 and 9 p.m. Be respectful of your neighbors and plan accordingly.
- 🎃 Tell your children not to eat any candy until it is inspected by you or a supervising adult.

Are you prepared for the next major earthquake or natural disaster?

The recent hurricanes in Texas and Florida brought to our attention the need for qualified volunteers who are ready to help our community at a moment's notice. If you are prepared for the next major disaster and want to be a part of local relief efforts, you may want to consider joining the Daly City CERT.

The North County Fire Authority teaches CERT classes to prepare individuals to perform basic first-aid and light search and rescue during times of emergency. In addition, CERT classes will teach you how to build a disaster supply kit for your home, work and vehicle, properly use a fire extinguisher and much more.

CERT is a FREE program open to all Daly City and Brisbane residents.

## City Offers Lunch Program for Seniors at Two Locations



For more than 20 years, the Congregate Nutrition Lunch Program has provided healthy meals to thousands of Daly City seniors. In August, the City of Daly City received a \$197,837 grant through the Older Americans Act and San Mateo County to help fund the program through June 2018. The grant supplements the City's contribution to the program that provides balanced meals along with nutrition education to seniors at the Doelger Senior Center and Lincoln Community Center locations. Lunch is served Monday through Friday from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Each year, Daly City prepares and serves more than 35,000 meals to seniors 60-years old and older. The program consists of more than just meals; staff and volunteers create a social and engaging atmosphere, and teach participants about physical and mental health and well-being.

Daly City is grateful for the funding received through the Older Americans Act and the San Mateo County's Aging and Adult Services to support the Congregate Nutrition Lunch Program.

## **Junipero Serra Redevelopment**

The 1837 Junipero Serra site is one step closer to being redeveloped. On August 21, the Daly City City Council approved two teams to submit proposals to develop the 1.26-acre site into a full-service hotel with at least 200 rooms.

The City envisions the site, which sits adjacent to the Daly City BART Station and the 280 freeway, being transformed into a transit-oriented development that provides temporary accommodations for business and recreational travelers.

City entitlements allow for a 210,000 square-foot (s.f.) hotel, and includes 350 parking spaces in an adjacent parking structure. The City is requesting that additional amenities include up to 25,000 s.f. of meeting and banquet space, a full-service restaurant and an indoor pool.

Majestic Hotel and AF Canta have proposed a concept plan for a 200-room boutique hotel with amenities including a 4,000 s.f. outdoor heated pool area, 4,190 s.f. food and beverage space, rooftop bar, wellness studio and retail shops. Ayres Hotel has proposed a similar 200-room boutique hotel.

The next step is for the two developers to submit specific details to support their proposals. Some of those details will include a proposed project description and schedule, buyer qualifications, purchase price and funding sources, and a timeline for closing.

Based on this information and previously received proposals, the City Council will then review, deliberate and potentially select a preferred developer for the Junipero Serra site.
